Secretary's Report Mini Minutes from LCA Executive Board Meeting

The winter meeting of the LCA Executive Board was held at the Renaissance Hotel, Baton Rouge, LA on September 26, 2015. Tim Fields presented the Conference Report that 1129 were pre-registered for the LCA Conference.

- Diane Austin discussed the possible locations of the LCA Conference 2017: Cajundome in Lafayette and the Pontchartrain Convention Center in Kenner. The board voted against each location. A discussion of Hilton Riverside in New Orleans was also discussed as a possible location but more research is needed.
- A donation fee to Operation Hero of \$500 was added to the Budget 2015-16.
- According to the ADA, LCA must supply reasonable accommodations for those disabled. The Commission for the Deaf has funded the eight interpreters this year.

- In the Membership Report Tim Fields offered that LCA sent letters to LPC's who did not renew membership. There are two members with Organizational Membership with a \$300 cost. Sign-Up to Become a Volunteer!

Past events, including Hurricanes Katrina and Rita, and the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, have increased the national attention given to public health emergency preparedness. These events underscored the need for an emergency "surge" or supplemental health care workforce that can be mobilized to respond immediately to mass casualty events. Emergency System for Advance Registration of Volunteer Health Professionals (ESAR-VHP) provides a systematic pro-

cess for statewide medical volunteer coordination in the event of an emergency. Louisiana's approach to ESAR-VHP is Louisiana Volunteers in Action (LAVA).

Scan to Register

LAVA establishes a pool of precredentialed, ready-to-deploy volunteer health professionals that could be uti-



lized during emergencies. To date the program has over 6,000 medical and non-medical volunteers registered with the program. Of the total registered volunteers, less than 2% consist of Mental Health Professionals. The LAVA Program is housed in the Louisiana Department of Health and Hospitals, Office of Public Health – Center Community Preparedness.

She spoke about several important topics, such as ways to end the mass incarceration we have in Louisiana, protecting the rights of children, and how the community needs to be actively involved not only in voting, but in the involvement of citizens in the work of government

For those of you who have attended my presentations at the Conference in the past, you know that this idea is a misrepresentation.
